16 Names of God from the Old Testament

The Lord Jesus was God Himself come to be with us, so all these names apply to Him as well as to God, His and our Heavenly Father ... they are One. (John 10:30 14:9)

Elohim meaning “God”, a reference to God’s power & might **Gen. 1:1; Ps. 19:1**

Adonai meaning “Lord” a reference to the Lordship of God **Mal. 1:6**

Jehovah (sometimes spelled **Yahweh**), a reference to God’s divine salvation **Gen. 2:4**

Jehovah-Maccaddeshem meaning “The Lord thy sanctifier” **Ex. 31:13**

Jehovah-Rohi meaning “The Lord my shepherd” **Ps. 23:1**

Jehovah-Shammah meaning “The Lord who is present” **Ezek. 48:35**

Jehovah-Rapha meaning “The Lord our healer” **Exod. 16:26**

Jehovah-Tsidkenu meaning “The Lord our righteousness” **Jer. 23:6**

Jehovah-Jireh meaning “The Lord will provide” **Gen. 22:13-14**

Jehovah-Nissi meaning “The Lord our banner” **Exod. 17:15**

Jehovah-Shalom meaning “The Lord is peace” **Judges 6:24**

Jehovah-Sabaoth meaning “Lord of Hosts” **Is. 6:1-3**

EI-Elyon meaning “The most high God” **Gen. 14:17-20; Is. 14:13-14**

EI-Roi meaning “The one who sees” **Gen. 16:12**

EI-Shaddai meaning “The God of the mountains” or “God almighty” **Gen. 17:1; Ps. 91:1**

EI-Olam meaning “The everlasting God” **Is. 40:28-31**

Note on the use of the name “Jehovah” – Jehovah in this list is the Hebrew word YHWH. The best translation of YHWH in English is “I Am who I Am”. In the Hebrew manuscripts of the OT, this name of God was so revered by the Jews that they would almost never actually pronounce it. When they came to YHWH, they would say “Lord” (“Adonai” in Hebrew) instead. In the Masoretic text, the oldest extant manuscript in Hebrew, the vowel markings in fact from “Adonai” are put under the letters of YHWH in order to make the word unpronounceable in Hebrew and to remind the cantor to pronounce “Adonai” instead. So if someone simply transliterates the Masoretic text with the Hebrew vowel markings for “Adonai”, you get “Jehovah” (the Y is the Hebrew letter *yod*, which sometimes is transliterated as a “j” and the W is the Hebrew letter *waw*, which sometimes is translated “v”). With the correct vowel markings, however, you get Yahweh. Hence, Jesus incurs the wrath of the Jews by taking the divine name upon himself in John 8:58, “...before Abraham was, I AM”. Most translations of the OT today use LORD for YHWH, with the caps indicating the divine name, essentially following the usage of orthodox Judaism (in OT times as far we can tell, and certainly today).
